Full Color Updates KTX-TV Viewing

Color was the key to the launching of a new era in educational television, as KTX-TV, Texas Tech's educational television station began color television production in late November.

Now in full swing and full color, the station is utilizing approximately \$361,000 worth of color production equipment. Funds for the equipment were obtained through a \$270,000 grant in 1973 from the Educational Broadcasting Facilities Program of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and from station funds.

As part of the Division of Continuing Education, KTX-TV was licensed to Tech through the Board of Regents in 1961, and began broadcasting in black and white in 1962, according to station manager John Henson '64 and '69. Capabilities for broadcast of network-originated color programs were added to the station in 1969.

The HEW grant helped provide for the purchase and installation of all new facilities, Henson said.

The airing of the first color program, a series of discussions of what a university is and how it functions, was ironically dubbed "Double Take", which is probably just how many viewers reacted upon seeing the transition from black and white to color filming.

"We have some of the best equipment in this part of the country," he claimed. "New facilities include two color cameras, two video tape recorders, a switcher, two control panels, color monitors, electronic test equipment, and other miscellaneous items."

Establishment of KTX-TV was for educational purposes, Henson added. It is one of approximately fifty university-owned and operated stations in the nation, and because the station is a non-profit educational television station, no commercials or advertising are broadcast.

Henson said, "Because we are a non-profit station, it isn't so much our aim to get public audiences as it is to get target audiences. KTX-TV is not a commercial enterprise in any way. Educational stations like ours are their own networks. Each station is able to have individual input into different stations."

Funding for KTX-TV occurs through university allocation and through grants from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB). Henson explained the CPB is a non-government corporation established by the federal congress to distribute federal funds among public television stations.

"The money is distributed on the basis of how much local money a

station receives, which in our case is money from the University. It is also based on how large the potential audience is."

A production grant has been responsible for a large part of the programming for the last five years, said Henson.

Under the station's network, the Public Broadcasting System (PBS), Henson said KTX-TV operates one open-circuit station, Channel 5. Channel 5 serves the entire Lubbock community, and as Henson said, "It broadcasts to anyone who has a television set."

"We are responsible to PBS to some degree," Henson said, "because we have an agreement with them to broadcast and operate the station in a certain manner. They provide us with a majority of our broadcasts and have always done their best to help us in any way possible."

Since its opening, five closed-circuit channels have been added to KTX-TV's broadcast capabilities. Henson said the closed circuit channels, channels 2, 4, 6, 8 and 10, serve only Texas Tech for educational purposes in the classroom.

"On the closed circuit channels," he said, "we work in collaboration with different departments on the Tech campus. If a department wants something produced for a

class showing, the department merely call us up, talks over the idea, production of the program occurs, and a classroom time and channel number are assigned."

Henson continued, "Under most circumstances there is no charge to the department for production, especially since the station is University-owned. Special charges are made if special props or graphics are needed that the station doesn't have, and must acquire."

He continued, "We have faculty members put together some things needed for their particular needs, and they provide additional people if they need them."

A variety of programs are offered by KTXT-TV, according to Henson. Out of the more than 60 hours of broadcast time per week, regular programs include health affairs, consumer interests, music, anthropology, art and others.

"Many of the local programs are done in cooperation with the academic departments, such as anthropology, entomology, the museum, and others," Henson said.

"Every now and then we have a series with the Park Administration department. They bring people that are renowned in the field of park administration, landscape architecture, and other related fields. We record about an hour program with these people, which makes for an interesting program that you don't get just anywhere," he said.

"As with the Tech academic departments on closed-circuit channels," he continued, "we've also done quite a bit of work with the community. Our contact with both these groups has picked up considerably since the addition of color production."

A program that has brought national acclaim for KTXT-TV concerns aviation safety, of which KTXT-TV is the only station in the United States to offer the Federal Aviation Administration time for the service program.

Henson said, "Just recently the

Regent office of the FAA awarded us a certificate of appreciation, the highest award presented by the regents, and the fourth highest award the FAA gives. Needless to say, we were very proud and pleased to receive the award."

A number of specials have been broadcast on KTXT-TV, ranging from the "Ascent of Man" to dramatic and musical shows in the community and by Tech. One program broadcasted for the Home Economics Department was "The Consumer Survival Kit", a show designed to inform today's shoppers.

KTXT-TV broadcasts from 3 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. weekdays, and from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. on weekends, Henson said. Approximately six per cent of the programs are locally produced. PBS supplies the majority of the other production. Henson said programs are also acquired from program libraries and governmental agencies.

"The reason we only produce six per cent of our own programming," he explained, "is because our staff and equipment are low." Out of a staff of ten full-time employees and five part-time student employees, Henson said about four of them produce all the local programming.

"In our closed-circuit channels, we produce about all of our own programs," Henson said. "Academic departments do much of their own production for classroom work, such as the chemistry, food and nutrition and clothing and textiles departments."

KTXT-TV also allows the Mass Communications department of Tech to use their facilities for laboratory purposes. Henson said the station is not connected with the department in any way, nor does the department broadcast from the station, but students do utilize the equipment in a learning process.

Possibilities for expansion of KTXT-TV are rather slim at this time, according to Henson. "Although we occasionally 'wire-up'

additional rooms in the building to expand our facility," he said, "we don't have the necessary funds to enlarge right now. We'd like to enlarge both our production capacity and staff."

Henson said the only way to increase the 50-mile radius of the station's broadcasting ability would be to increase the station's power and its tower height.

"We were fortunate to receive the color equipment we so wanted," he said. "A possible reason we acquired the equipment was the fact that KTXT was the only educational station in the state of Texas with no color. Our needs put us in a high area of precedence over other stations, so we got our equipment."

Henson concluded "Everyone is very excited about our new image. Color production will add a new dimension to programs at KTXT-TV, and special visual effects which will add versatility and excitement to local programs are possible with the new equipment."

New Degree Offered in Museum Science

With all the splendor of natural history and science, blended with innovations for a new and better world and growing challenges in education for Lubbock and Texas Tech, the Tech Museum has added yet another program to its already brimming repertoire. That addition is in the form of a Master's degree in Museum Science, Tech now being one of the few institutions in the United States to offer such a degree.

Alfred D. Bjelland, coordinator of education for the museum, and a member of the new program's faculty, explained, "As far as we know, Tech has the only broad-based, university oriented program such as this for museum science in the nation. There are a few other institutions that offer, for example, historic preservation degrees, or other single area degrees. At Tech, we offer options in history, science, art and anthropology, with specific areas of study in each for the degree in museum science."

Dr. Craig Black, Museum director, said the program came about as a result of a challenge by Tech President Grover Murray when Black took over as Museum director in July, 1972. "The challenge was to better involve the Museum in the university teaching program, strengthening the programs and ties in it, and thus integrating the Museum as a definite part of the university," he said.

Black said interest in the implementation of the Master's program in museum science was initiated and developed by several people, including Dean J. Knox Jones, vice president of research and graduate studies. Black and Jones, both from the University of Kansas, were interested in possibilities for the program from their background at the University of Kansas, and from Black's background at Carnegie Museum in Pittsburgh.

Black said, "We attended several national conventions, conferences, visited other museums and discussed the needs of university museum programs. It was obvious from these trips and discussions that no broad-based professional degree training programs in museum science were offered in the nation, other than in only one area of study. There was just no place covering a degree in all aspects of museum studies.

"So an advisory committee was set up in fall of 1972 to see what might be accomplished and to begin gathering curriculum for the program," he continued. The committee members were Dr. William Conroy, associate Dean of Arts and Sciences; Dr. David Vigness, chairman of the history department; Dr. Robert Packard, professor of biological sciences; Dr. William J. Mayer-

Oakes, chairman of anthropology; Dr. Lawrence Graves, Dean of College of Arts and Sciences; and Dr. Black.

After developing the curriculum and core courses for the program, approval by the State Coordinating Board was granted in Jan., 1974, and the program was implemented last fall, Black said.

The announcement of the opening of the museum science program was sent to nearly 1,000 universities, museums and individuals across the country. A surprise enrollment of 31 students in the fall exceeded the expected enrollment by 15 students. Two more students came into the program at the beginning of the spring semester. Bjelland said approximately six students in the program are graduates of Tech, 13 students are from Texas schools, and the remaining 20 students are from out-of-state.

The format of the new museum science Master's program will be quite unique in itself. To begin with, it is based totally in the Tech Museum, a facility with 140,000 square feet of space devoted to exhibits, collections, laboratories, and classrooms. The Tech Museum education program is the first in the country to administer the program through a university museum rather than through the art, anthropology, history or science department.

The program will utilize a variety of existing courses offered by various departments in the university, as well as 12 new courses at the Master's level. Bjelland explained, "The core program includes about 15 hours of museum science and 24 hours of related graduate level study. The related study is that area of museum work the individual student is interested in, for example, anthropology, museum administration (in connection with the Business Administration department), zoology, and others."

Other related courses include botany, architecture, art, clothing and textiles, computer science, geography, geology, history, mass communications and park administration. Curriculum is tailored for each student.

Six hours of Master's thesis work is also required, Bjelland said. A non-thesis option is offered with six hours of independent study or internship at the Tech Museum or another approved museum elsewhere in the country. The Children's Museum in Boston and the National Park Service Museum at Harper's Ferry are two such approved museums.

When asked what kind of work students were currently participating in Bjelland said, "There are a vari-

ety of projects going on right now, as well as a number of assistantships with faculty representatives. There is one group working on a major exhibit about the 30th anniversary of World War II. That exhibit is expected to be completed by May.

"There are also several students involved in projects at the Lubbock Lake Site working on archeological findings, and some are working at Ranch Headquarters," he continued.

The Museum has extensive research collections in anthropology, art, biology, geo-science and history, in which many of the students work. Ranch Headquarters provides a 12-acre "outdoor laboratory" for course work dealing with historical restoration, preservation and interpretation.

The first students to earn the degree of Master of Arts in Museum Science at Tech will be Kenneth Perry and Steve Williams, both of Midland. Perry, when asked to comment on the program, spoke with enthusiasm about it.

"I think the overall program is great," he said. "Besides offering so much in the field of museum science, the 24 hours of related, specialized work outside of the museum core courses prevents limiting a student from pursuing any specialty he's interested in.

"My case is a little different from the other students'," he continued. "I was a graduate student in Tech's department of history when I learned about the museum program. My own reasons for getting into this field include the economic situation in the field of humanities and promising employment opportunities in museum science."

Perry said he feels the museum program offers a flexibility other fields lack in that as well as the basic types of museum work, one can find related work in the fields of business, mass communications, clothing and textiles and a number of other things.

"This profession takes in and absorbs so many disciplines, I would say it is wide open for people coming into it," Perry said. "There also seems to be a sort of forward propulsion by people for developing bigger and better museums. The traditional 'two-lady museum', that is run by a very small staff who does all the work involved in museum management, is vanishing. There is a need for specialists, whether they be exhibit designers, builders, administrators, researchers, or what."

Perry is currently working on an in-house internship in which he is learning all aspects of museum work. He said, "The internship program gives students the opportunity to work in the profession for a short time, plus get paid and earn graduate credit while doing so."

He continued, "In the internship I've learned so many things I could never get in the classroom. At the same time, it's the perfect place to apply what I have learned in class. The on-the-job experience is invaluable to the student."

Another area Perry praised was that of faculty-student relations. "In other graduate departments, there is sometimes a lack of communication between teacher and student. Here everyone seems to be on basically the same level of communication, and we all work together on projects and plans, not separately."

Perry said he felt the only problem area he could detect in the museum science program was that of balancing and building up the faculty that teaches the museum science core courses. "But that problem," he said, "will be solved only in a matter of time, because the program is still so new and development is constant at this stage.

"Really," he commented, "I don't see anything in the program but positive possibilities."

The faculty for the museum science core courses are top educators in their respective fields. Faculty members include Bjelland, M.A., Univ. of Kansas, education; Black, Ph.D., Harvard Univ., biology and geology; Hugh H. Genoways, Ph.D., Univ. of Kansas; biology; Mary Elizabeth King, Ph.D., Univ. of Arizona, anthropology; Eugene Kingman, B.F.A., Yale Univ., art; and Willard B. Robinson, M.Arch., Rice Univ., architecture.

In anticipation for the future, Black expressed hopes for a larger faculty, and for implementation of more courses, both in the museum science core and in related fields. He said the program at this time seems successful, though it has only been in operation for one full semester.

Black also said it is a hope of the faculty that the program will provide students with the professional competence to contribute significantly to all types of museum programs across the country. The increasing demands being made on museum resources and programs across the nation indicate the program will be very helpful for the future.

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The extension of Indiana Avenue through the Campus moved one step closer to reality and a request for the approval of a School of Nursing highlighted a meeting of the Texas Tech Board of Regents on January 31.

The decision, made in the presence of Lubbock Mayor Roy Bass and city planning officials, brought nearer to a close—at least for now—one of the hottest debates in the city's history.

The extension of the road will connect 19th Street on the South and the new Lubbock County Hospital, that is to be constructed adjacent to the Medical School, on 4th Street. The \$19 million dollar hospital is being constructed with county and federal funds at no expense to Tech and will handle most emergency cases.

The plan includes future construction of a freeway from Quaker Avenue north to the Brownfield Highway and east of 4th Street to University Avenue, thereby paving the way for elimination of the already congested Tech Freeway.

In another resolution, the board authorized the Tech administration to advertise for and accept bids on the construction so long as they do not exceed cost estimates on the project of \$640,000. The Board had earlier decided to use University Funds rather than ask either the State Highway Department or the City to build the road.

Dr. Richard A. Lockwood, vice-president for the Health Sciences Center, urged that the board approve a plan involving training of nurses at four levels. The advantage of this, he said, is "the training of several types of personnel in the same setting."

In proposing the nursing school, Lockwood cited results of a nursing project survey completed last year by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, which indicates the need for such a facility in the Lubbock area.

Also, Lockwood pointed out,

more than 250 students are presently enrolled at Tech in a pre-nursing program.

The School of Nursing remains subject to approval by the coordinating board and to funding by the state legislature.

Before the meeting, board chairman Formby said an attempt would be made to establish a priority system for judging proposed expenditures and allocating university money. But no such system took shape as the regents fell into an argument over the proper use of Tech's existing facilities.

Before authorizing more construction, J. Fred Bucy said, "I think the board ought to decide what kind of school we need and where it should grow."

Bucy noted several projects on the list which he said might be considered "pets" of different regents. He mentioned the request for \$800,000 to equip the new mass communications building as Board Chairman Clint Formby's favorite. He associated Regent Charles Scruggs with new facilities at Pantex and New Deal. He admitted some people might see a link between himself and some of the projects.

"It seems to me as if we have a sacred cow technique of establishing priorities," said Bucy.

The debate ended with passage of a resolution authorizing planning of a proposed \$1 million expansion at Tech's Textile Research Center. The move, supported by Bucy and introduced by Regent Charles Scruggs, was based on the facility's proven attractiveness to area industry.

"The center already has been responsible for bringing in construction" in excess of \$50 million, Scruggs said.

Earlier, Scruggs introduced another successful resolution designating Tech's Ranch Headquarters as the Ranching Heritage Center and reiterating the board's support of the facility.

The regents also agreed to a request from Coca-Cola to raise the price of soft drinks from 10 cents to 15 cents in campus vending machines. The increase is to cover the cost of syrup in soft drinks. Half of the increase will go to Coca-Cola and the other half to the Residence Halls Association and Tech intramurals.

The Board also:

—Okayed the establishment of a department of entomology in the College of Agricultural Sciences.

—Approved the merger of the department of agricultural engineering and food technology into a department of agricultural engineering and technology.

—Authorized the establishment of a department of family management, housing and consumer science.

—Approved a request to the Federal Communications Commission for an increase in power at KTXT-FM from 10 watts to 1,000 watts.

All of the Regents were present except Frank Junell of San Angelo, whose term was scheduled to expire that day. The terms of Charles Scruggs and Trent Campbell '32, Houston, also expired. However the three will continue to serve until their replacements are named.

Ex-Students Undertake Student Recruiting

Academic Student Recruiting will be one of the main objectives of the Ex-Students Association in 1975 according to Association President Pete Baker, '61, Abilene.

In announcing the new program, Baker said "although the news media assist in telling the Texas Tech story day by day and the Admissions staff meets with many high school students throughout Texas, there are many potential students, particularly those in the Southwest, that know little about Texas Tech or its educational opportunities. We feel that the Association, our local chapters, and individual Exes can help to remedy this."

Assisting in the recruitment of good students is another way that Exes can help Texas Tech, Baker continued.

In January the Association staff mailed more than 2,100 personally typed letters to high school seniors that had shown an interest in Texas Tech that had not yet contacted the University. With each letter, a folder on the University and a card that the student could return if they wanted more information were enclosed.

All Exes are being encouraged to send in the names and addresses of both high school juniors and seniors that they feel would be a potentially good student at Texas Tech.

Members of the Association Board and Staff have met with the Student Association, University Administration and faculty as well as the Board of Regents on a detailed recruiting program for the University. Representatives of the different groups have expressed

eagerness to work collectively in this program.

Baker stated that the letter writing was the first phase of the program which also calls for personal contacts of prospective students by Exes living in the same community.

In learning of the program, a number of academic department heads have volunteered to contact those prospective students who express an interest in their area of study. A plan is also being discussed by Bill Allen, Tom Carr and other representatives of the Student Association whereby several days would be set aside this spring when students will be encouraged to visit the Campus. Various campus organizations would serve as host to the visiting high school students by not only touring the campus but also

introducing faculty members who can answer their questions.

A University Administrator stated that at a time when many Colleges and Universities are experiencing declining enrollments, it is very refreshing to see the Ex-Students Association with coordinated effort of students and faculty take the lead in seeing that the enrollment level is maintained.

Enrollment in the freshman class at Tech increased slightly last fall after having been on a decline for several years.

The decreased birth rate eighteen years ago combined with the current national economic situation is expected to have an effect on the number of entering freshman at Colleges and Universities next fall as well as in years to come.

Texas Tech 'Committee 50' Established

The number 50, currently a predominant numeral in Tech's semi-centennial celebration, is now playing an equivalent part in the shaping of Tech's future. It takes this new shape in what is known as "Committee 50."

Committee 50, designated as such because of the activity during Texas Tech's 50th anniversary, is an advisory committee to assist the university in the establishment of long-range goals and objectives.

Dr. Len C. Ainsworth, associate vice president for academic affairs and staff officer for the project, explained the committee is composed of 54 members, selected by President Grover Murray and the Board of Regents.

The committee was formed as a result of a 1974 resolution by the Board of Regents. Ainsworth said the committee was selected carefully to obtain geographic representation across the state of Texas, and to involve a wide range of personal and professional interests, including several noted educators, publishing executives and professional people.

Ainsworth said the committee's work will involve making projections and plans on enrollments and on the physical plant, as well as other programs, and it will have the responsibility of determining where the university should be ten years from now.

"An important part of the program," Ainsworth explained, "involves input from the faculty, staff and students. A series of meetings with school and college faculties, as well as a questionnaire for a representative group of students and faculty from each college, will invite input from them as to the concerns, directions and goals of the university."

Ainsworth continued, "We're looking for both individual and unitary input. All faculty and separate units will be asked to submit

goals. Committee 50 will then help refine and establish goals for the university."

Ainsworth explained other sources of evaluative information will be gathered from library research on general goals, reviewing goals from other institutions, and obtaining goal statements from faculty groups with whom President Murray is now meeting.

Six subcommittees, made up of members of the main committee, have been appointed specific areas to evaluate. The subcommittees and duties include: Academics, programs/priorities; Health Sciences Centers, programs/priorities; Students, enrollments/services; Facilities, uses/needs; Resources, state/other; and Organization, administration/financial.

An orientation meeting of the entire membership was held in October, and two more large meetings are projected for the spring, according to Ainsworth.

Recommendations from Committee 50 will take into account things which Tech should aim for and areas that are no longer necessary for the university's development. The report will join evaluative material given the committee to help them better grasp prospects for the future.

"Work of the committee should go on through the spring and probably into the summer," he said. "By the time the student, faculty and committee input is combined, it may be fall before the report is available. When it is available, there will be widespread distribution of it on campus and statewide, on presentation to the Board of Regents."

Ainsworth said if the project is successful, the goals developed should be "a source of interest and concern to future development of programs and resources, and an aid to the Board of Regents." Assess-

ment and modification of goals will take place in years to come.

TENNIS OUTLOOK

Head coach George Philbrick's team will begin play this spring facing the task of filling the vacancy left by the illness of freshman sensation Jon Brotherton. Brotherton was forced to leave school at semester because of a serious kidney ailment and will not be able to compete until next fall at the earliest, according to Philbrick. The Wichita Falls Rider product, who was AAAA state singles champ as a junior and state doubles titlist as a senior, had run up a 4-0 singles match record in fall competition.

"We're not as strong as I had thought we would be because of the loss of Brotherton, but we've got some people that can play. We'll just have to pick up the slack," Philbrick said.

To add further to the health problems, senior John Moffett may miss early matches with a sore arm. "John had to have a heel operation last fall," commented Philbrick, "and he's been hitting so many balls trying to get back in shape that he's developed some arm trouble."

The Tech Tennis Team posted a 3-0 fall record.

GOLF OUTLOOK


Texas Tech golfers of fourth-year head coach Danny Mason opened their spring schedule Feb. 27 when they competed in the Border Olympics at Laredo.

"We'll be less experienced than last year," Mason said, "but I think we will be a better team overall. Danny Walters was the Texas Junior College Champion last year at Western Texas and his play should help us a great deal. Also, John Conine is a five-year senior who will give us some experience and leadership."

The Red Raiders finished ninth in the 29-team field at the Border Olympics last year. "Walters and sophomore Jeff Mitchell have both been shooting in the low 70's and everyone has been improving when we get to play regularly," Mason says.

In the fall SWC tournament, Tech finished fourth among the nine SWC teams, behind Houston, UT-Austin and SMU.

"I feel like we can play better than we did in the fall tournament," Mason emphasized. "We could be a challenger in the conference race if some of our kids come along like I think they can."



Probable entrees for Texas Tech in early matches will be Walters, from Abilene; Mitchell, from Llano; Conine, from Lubbock Monterey; Steve Long, from Melbourne, Australia; Neil Haddock, San Antonio McArthur; and Mel Callender, a San Marcos freshman.

Long is a junior from Melbourne, Australia who averaged 77 strokes a round for the Raiders last year. His best effort came at the New

Mexico State Intercollegiate where he shot an 18-hole round of 73. In competition at Laredo last year he posted a four-round total of 315.

Haddock did not play in tournament competition last year but the San Antonio (MacArthur) product "has improved greatly this spring" according to Mason and should be a key to Tech's success this season.

A freshman from San Marcos, Callender has not yet competed for the Raiders. "Mel has really been coming on this spring," Mason commented. "If he can continue to improve like he has this spring, he will help us a great deal."

Other members of the Tech golf squad who could see action are Alan Carmichael, sophomore; Richard Mattox, sophomore; and Jobe Moss, sophomore.

TRACK OUTLOOK

Under head coach Vernon Hilliard, in his 11th year as head of the Tech track program, the Raiders are in the process of a rebuilding campaign. There are only two seniors on the Tech roster.

The thinclads will probably be strongest in the sprints this spring because of depth. Three-fourths of last year's mile relay team returns in junior Tony Harris, senior Randal Hall and sophomore William Pierson. They will be joined by freshman Garye Price who is considered one of the top sprint prospects to come to Tech in several years. Ray Polite, a freshman from Galveston (Ball), will give quality depth to the relays as well as competing in individual sprint competition.

Harris, a native of Hugo, Okla., who serves as captain of the team, could develop into one of the top quartermilers in the Southwest Conference according to Hilliard. "Tony should be a contender at the SWC meet," Hilliard said. "A fraction of a second could decide the first four places so it's hard to tell, but he's definitely got a shot."

Tech's biggest improvement should come in the field events, an

area where the Raiders have suffered from a lack of depth and quality performers in past years. Tom McIntyre, who finished fourth at the SWC meet last spring, should again be strong in the long jump. He will be joined by a pair of junior college transfers who come with big credentials and a sophomore high jumper who had an outstanding indoor season.

Chuck Druery, a Ranger JC product, will bring strength to the shot put and discus events. The native of Bryan has thrown the shot better than 44 feet and has hurled the disc 166 feet.

Probably the biggest lift to the

track program will come from Ken-ny Norris, a two year junior college All-American in the javelin from Allen County JC, Iola, Kans.

Norris went 239 feet in competition last year and believes he can improve on that. "I think that I should be able to about 240 in the first two or three meets, he said. "I'd like to be able to improve on that by about 15 feet before the season ends," he added. "I've been throwing well in workouts and I think that I could really improve this year if things go right."

Tech has another top field event man in Midland sophomore Bryant Huckabay. He cleared 6-9 1/4

twice during the indoor season and was second in the Border Olympics a year ago.

In the distance events the Raiders will rely on a pair of sophomores. Mark Freeman set a school record in the mile at the conference meet last spring running a 4:11.2. If can continue to improve this spring he could be a key to the Tech track fortunes.

Terrell Pendleton, a product of Desales High School in Louisville, Ky., established school records in the three-mile and the steeplechase last year and could develop into one of the finest distance men in Tech track history.

BASEBALL OUTLOOK

The 1975 Red Raider baseball season opened February 14 with a pair of doubleheaders against UT-El Paso. Head Coach Kal Segrist said he was looking forward to the non-conference games to answer some questions about the squad.

"We had hoped to be a lot further along than we are, especially with the pitchers," analyzed Segrist. "We don't have anyone who has thrown more than 10 innings in competition this spring where we had hoped that at least our starters would have about 30 innings in by now. Also, we have a lot of junior college kids that I haven't seen play

much in competition. We're pretty uncertain about a lot of things right now."

The baseballers return 11 lettermen from last year's 11-22 season. However, only four were fulltime starters.

Mike Bewley returns in the outfield after being named to the All-District VI team a year ago. The Lubbock (Coronado) product hit .290 for the season last year and .353 in SWC competition.

Dr. & Mrs. William Curry Holden have been presented the Ruth Lester Award for Merituous Achievement in Historic Preservation by the Texas Historical Commission.

Dr. Billy I. Ross, chairman of the Department of Mass Communications, was named "Educator of the Year" by the Tenth District, American Advertising Federation.

The district includes Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana.

Dr. Berlie J. Fallon, associate dean for Graduate Studies in the College of Education, has been elected chairman of the Advisory Panel on Commissions (APC) for Phi Delta Kappa, fraternity for professional educators. The seven-member panel, with one representative from each of Phi Delta Kappa's districts, reviews and evaluates project proposals and programs of the various commissions of the 90,000-plus member fraternity. search Center; **William D. Sandel**, professor of industrial engineering; and **Dale A. Courtney**, director of Texas Tech's Engineering Services.

Dr. Mina W. Lamb, professor of food and nutrition, has been named recipient of a Mortar Board Teacher Recognition Award, presented annually to outstanding Tech instructors.

Lamb has been at Tech for more than 30 years. She currently holds the title of Margaret W. Weeks Professor.

Lubbock Mayor Roy Bass has appointed **Dr. John R. Bradford**, dean of the College of Engineering, as chairman of the newly-formed Community Development Advisory Committee.

The committee will be composed of 19 citizen representatives and Bradford. Its purpose will be to seek out and coordinate citizen input on the types of programs which will be needed in the future development of Lubbock. The committee will be instrumental in helping to formulate guidelines for the expenditure of some \$27 million in federal funds designated for Lubbock over the next six years.

Dr. Randall T. Jones, has received \$41,000 from the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases to study **Neisseria gonorrhoeae**, the bacteria that cause gonorrhea.

Dr. Doyle Z. Williams of the College of Business Administration has been named a trustee of the Educational Foundation of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants, Inc.

The foundation, headquartered in Dallas, seeks to aid, promote and develop accounting education and research. The foundation administers a loan program for accounting students in Texas colleges and universities and conducts an awards program for accounting excellence and graduate fellowship awards.

Williams is professor of business administration and coordinator of the Area of Accounting at Texas Tech.

Ranch Headquarters In Fund Raising Drive

The Ranch Headquarters Association is conducting a fund raising drive to raise \$392,000 for completion of the outdoor exhibit of the ranching history at the Museum at Texas Tech.

The Ranch Headquarters, when completed, will record with buildings and other visible records of the past, the history of U.S. ranching from its beginnings on the Rio Grande up through the High Plains of Texas in the 20th Century.

The money will be used to move and restore structures to complete the project.

More than \$150,000 has been spent by Texas Tech in preparation of the Ranch Headquarters site, utilities and personnel. The Ranch Headquarters Association has contributed more than \$300,000 for the moving and restoration of the historic structures on the site. And a private gift of \$100,000 for an orientation center and memorial gallery has been received. These contributions from the university and the private sector, primarily within the ranching industry, have brought the Ranch Headquarters within sight of its goal.

More than 20,000 school children have toured the Ranch Headquarters since educational tours became available in January, 1973. During the past two years, more than 30,000 visitors have toured when the Ranch Headquarters was opened for a few hours each weekend. Last summer, when only Sunday tours were available in good weather, visitors from 47 states and 27 foreign countries came.

Dr. Murray Announces New Appointments

The appointment of Dr. George F. Meenaghan as dean for research at Texas Tech University Complex has been announced by President Grover E. Murray.

At the same time, Dr. Murray announced the appointment of Dr. James E. Halligan as chairman of the Department of Chemical Engineering, a post Dr. Meenaghan has held since 1969.

Meenaghan served half-time during the fall semester as director of Research Services.

Dr. Murray said that Meenaghan's responsibilities would include the development of more incentives for research, the strengthening of liaison between the university complex and funding agencies, and the improvement of the internal research structure at all levels, from departments through the administration.

Dr. Murray said that Meenaghan would continue as the director of Research Services and will, in addition, devote about one-third of his time to teaching and his own research. He will work with Dr. J. Knox Jones, vice president for research, and Dr. William R. John-



son, interim vice president for academic affairs.

"The creation of this deanship," Johnson said, "is a further step in Texas Tech's striving for first class status."

Halligan was selected as chairman by the unanimous vote of the faculty in chemical engineering, according to Engineering Dean John R. Bradford. He received the Distinguished Teaching Award in 1972 and, in the same year, was named outstanding engineering teacher by Tau Beta Pi engineering honorary fraternity on campus. This month he was honored for his research by the Livestock Environmental Services Committee.



His principal research efforts, in conjunction with other faculty members, have been in the areas of separations using liquid membranes and of solid waste as an energy source—on which he and colleagues reported in 1974 to the Governor's Energy Advisory Council, and the use of cotton wastes in the control of oil spills. His research has often been interdisciplinary and frequently a cooperative effort with other faculty members.

Meenaghan is a member of Tech's Athletic Council, chairman of the Faculty Development Leaves Committee, vice-chairman of the 50th Anniversary Activities Committee, and has served, among other assignments, as faculty sponsor of the Student Senate and on the Steering Committee of the Institutional Self-study Committee.

Survivors include his wife, Doralace, a son and two daughters.

Walter M. Pendleton, '37, died in an Amarillo hospital on November 3 from a massive coronary attack following surgery. A native of

THIS AND THAT

The Ranching Heritage Center, formerly known as the Ranch Headquarters at Texas Tech, should be completed early in 1976. Eleven of the structures are completed, three are being reconstructed now and four more will be moved in later. A visitor-orientation center is also to be constructed on the 12 acre site on Fourth Street late this year. The center will reopen in May for visitors on the weekends. It is well worth a visit.

The Army ROTC program on the Tech campus is in trouble. There are only 70 students enrolled in the four-year ROTC program.

The Department of Range and Wildlife Management has established a Range and Wildlife Scholarship Endowment Fund. Only the interest from the fund will be used for scholarships in the department.

Days of the combined head football coach-athletic director position may not be over, but the number of such titles is small. About the only exceptions to the rule are Alabama, Southern Cal, Texas, Arkansas (this year for the first time in years) and A&M. The jobs are separated at Notre Dame, Syracuse, Georgia Tech, Penn State, every school in the Big Ten, Big Eight, Atlantic Coast and WAC; all except "Bama in the SEC and all except USC in the Pac 8.

Personalized license plates are the "in thing" in Texas this year since the '75 plates must last for five years and the personalized ones will change each year. The most out of place one we have seen are on the car of the Chairman of the Texas Tech Foundation—the letters ACC. He also has plates with TT-LCC on another car. He might be described as a "banker that covers all fronts."

University (College) Avenue continues to change. **Rollin** and **Helenore (Reynolds '40) Herald '41**, announced last month they had sold the camera store portion of Herald Photo. However, they will be staying close to the Avenue to operate the Custom Processing Department.

A breathing exercise and physical fitness class for children with Asthma or other pulmonary diseases are being conducted by the Physical Therapy Department of the School of Medicine. The course, called "Buckin Bronchos," is sponsored by the West Texas Area of American Lung Association.

Texas Tech awarded its first two Doctor of Philosophy degrees in microbiology in August to **Marian Harder** and **Andrew D. Haumbach**. The two received a total of sixteen job offers, indicating the need for highly trained people in the field. Both have planned to enter research related to the study of chemistry. While doing doctoral work at Tech they have been working with the chemistry associated with cancer, although their studies have been with the bacterial systems.

The word we get is that with new brickwork and a new name, the tornado-damaged Great Plains Life Building in Lubbock should be ready for occupancy around the first of April. Gaut and Gaut Estate Investments of Amarillo bought the 20-story building last February. It has been vacant since May 11, 1970, when it was struck by a tornado.

More and more married students are attending Texas Tech. Last year 4,644 married students were enrolled.

Richard M. Styles '57, public relations consultant for the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in Richmond, Virginia, sent in some interesting information about Tech graduates. Of the 250 persons appointed in 1974 as foreign missionaries, Texas Tech had the largest number of graduates appointed for missionary service outside the Baptist schools. There were six 1974 Tech graduates appointed.

The **Houston Chapter** of the Association ran an advertisement in the Houston papers several days prior to the Tech-Rice basketball game urging all Tech fans to attend the game.

Kenneth Wilson '66 is President of the Houston Chapter. His Dad, **George Wilson '41** of Lubbock, is the current president of the Red Raider Club.

Veterans are enjoying increased educational benefits as a result of the new veterans bill. A veteran taking at least 12 semester hours gets \$270 instead of \$200. The educational allowance for dependents of veterans killed or permanently disabled was also increased to \$270 a month.

Warlick Carr '40, a Lubbock attorney, has been named Chairman of the Texas Tech Regents Council for the Future, a group of individuals devoted to raising relatively large gifts through different giving, and by other tax advantages to the donor. He succeeds **C. S. "Stoney" Wall**, former member of the Board of Regents and retired Pioneer Natural Gas Co. Executive, from Amarillo.

Since that time it has been announced that **Tom Wilson '66** will be Offensive Coordinator at Texas A&M and **Ted Unbehager** will be Offensive Line Coach at Rice. The third assistant, **Jess Stiles**, will remain on Sloan's staff but in a different position.

The Texas Tech Dads Association named **Dr. Barbara Cosper**, assistant professor in the Department of Food and Nutrition, to receive the association's Excellence in Teaching plaque, an award which recognizes professional performance during a teacher's first four years on the faculty.

ALCOHOL ON CAMPUS

The alcohol-on-campus issue is being revived this semester. Last year the Board of Regents voted 5-3 to disallow a proposal which would have permitted dorm residents to keep alcoholic beverages in their dorm rooms.

At this point, supporters seemed to be divided on whether to try the same plan again or to try for just beer in the University Center (Student Union).

Regent **J. Fred Bucy '51** led the argument last year against alcohol in the dorms. He was supported by **Trent**

Campbell '32. Regents Judson Williams and Clint Formby '49 led support for the alcohol issue.

If either issue comes up before the Regents this spring it could pass. Campbells term has expired and Bucy has announced that due to previous conflicts he will be unable to attend the March and May meetings of the Board. However, he has requested that Chairman Formby change the meeting dates.

The decision, if it comes up, may hinge on the new appointments to the Board of Regents. Then too, they may want to table discussion of either proposal until a later Board meeting.

STEVE SLOAN

New Red Raider Football Coach **Steve Sloan** has missed going to a bowl game only twice since he was a sophomore at Alabama in 1964, either as a player or coach. The two years were in 1967, when he was with the Atlanta Falcons, and 1973.

Born in Austin, Texas, Sloan at 30 years old is the youngest major college head coach in the nation.

An author, he wrote a book in 1966 titled, **Calling Life's Signals**, which has had steady sales since publication.

ANOTHER MEDICAL SCHOOL?

The College Coordinating Board said categorically "no" last year to a request by Texas Woman's University for a Medical School to be located in Fort Worth's north side. Earlier this year Governor Briscoe said that he insists that the Legislature create no more new schools unless approved by the Coordinating Board but the word is that he would like to see the Coordinating Board reverse its opinion.

However, the TWU medical school is now being pushed along by lobbyist-publicist **Jerry Hall '50**, former capitol reporter and press aide to former Governor Smith.

BASKETBALL

Red Raider basketball games are being aired in five West Texas and Eastern New Mexico radio stations in addition to two stations in Lubbock. The Ex-Students Association has mailed approximately 1,332 cards announcing the broadcasts to Exes living in the Hereford, Levelland, Hobbs, New Mexico, Lamesa and Pampa areas reminding them of the broadcast. Time of the broadcasts vary from station to station.

A new plateau of collegiate coaching for Red Raider Coach **Gerald Myers** was reached February 4 when his team beat TCU 72-61. The win made it victory number 100 for Coach Myers.

Bob Nash missed his first Red Raider basketball game in more than 15 years early in January when he failed to make the road trip to Oklahoma State and Creighton. Nash stayed home to MC an appreciation dinner for **Congressman and Mrs. George Mahon**. But Nash's record is surpassed by his play-by-play partner, **Jack Dale**, who holds the record. Dale hasn't missed a game since taking over the announcing assignment for KFYO in the mid-50's.

Exes that were reelected last fall to the House were **Elmer Tarbox '39**, Lubbock; **Tom Craddick '65**, Midland; **Pete Laney '65**, Hale Center; **R. B. McAllister '34**, Lubbock; and **John Hoestenbach '65**, of Odessa.

BERL HUFFMAN DAY

Tuesday, January 21 was proclaimed by Mayor Roy Bass as "**Berl Huffman Day**" in Lubbock. The popular former Red Raider Coach was honored at a luncheon meeting of the Lubbock Lions Club, of which he was President. His son **Walter '66**, is in his first year at Tech's School of Law and it is reported that at the end of the fall semester he had one of the top grade averages in the class.
